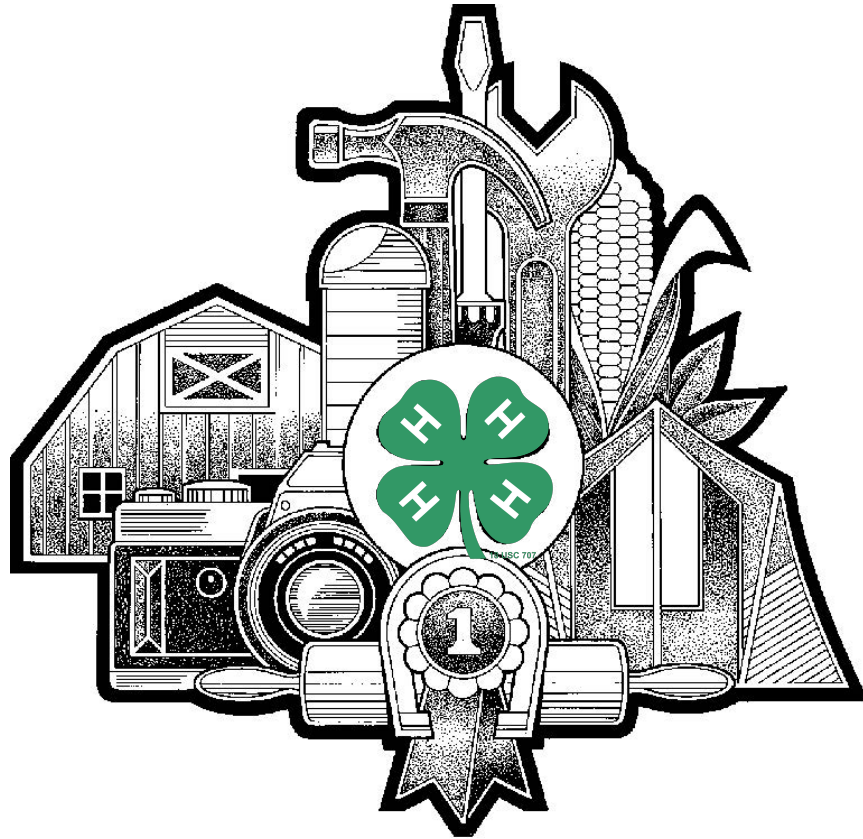

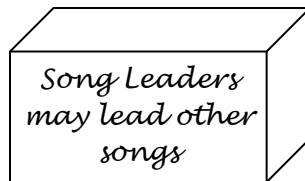



Start Your Personal 4-H Project

What is a 4-H project?

A project is an area of interest that a 4-H member chooses beginning in 5th Grade.

Although project work is independent study, you can ask an adult or teen leader, your parent, Ms. Kathy or Mr. Timmy if you need help. There are 27 projects.



Get started with your 4-H folder—decorate it for your 4-H project. Use it for all your project materials and activities.

Follow These Steps to a Successful 4-H Project...

Step 1: Using the “Project Plan Worksheet”, set three goals (use the project activity page suggestions or come up with your own.) Considering your resources, your goal should be specific, use action words, and have a goal date.

Step 2: For each goal, write an action plan—how you will accomplish your goal.

Step 4: Get busy reaching your goals. Follow your action plan. Complete your Activity Page. Go to the Tennessee 4-H project page for more resources.

Step 3: Record your work on the worksheet form. Write your story to tell what you accomplished, learned, or why it did not work.

Step 5: Before you turn in your project folder—include any extra work that you did. Turn in your 4-H project folder with the activity page and the project worksheet at your 4th club meeting.

4-H Project Portfolios (6th grade and up)

GOALS: To develop record keeping skills, written communication skills, participate in peer competitions and be recognized for project achievement. Another goal is to take your project folder to the next level.

The **4-H project portfolio** is for 4-H members who wish to be recognized in peer competition for outstanding project work. Detailed information on completing a project portfolio and profile forms can be found at the the Tennessee 4-H website at www.utextension.utk.edu/4h under forms and under programs. Junior High is the first level of competition—Junior High (6th—8th grade). In high school, your portfolio can be submitted to win scholarships, awards and/or trips and help you receive academic credit on your high school transcript.

STEPS

1. Keep a record of everything you do related to your 4-H project, leadership, citizenship and 4-H in general. A calendar is a good tool to use.
2. Go to the 4-H website to retrieve the guidelines for putting together a portfolio and the appropriate forms (Form 305, 305A, 305B, and 305C)
3. Attend a portfolio workshop or visit with Mr. Timmy or Mrs. Kathy for help.



Deadlines

NEW: create and submit website portfolio

Junior high portfolios are due in March. Academic Conference applications (includes part of portfolio) are due in March. Senior high portfolios in Citizenship and Leadership are due January 30. All other project portfolios are due May 1.

4th Grade 4-H Public Speaking Contest

GOAL: To improve verbal communication skills and build self-confidence by focusing on delivery skills when speaking to a group.



Communication is very important. It is how we let each other know what we are thinking, what we are feeling, and what is happening to us. What we do with our voice and our body language can also help us get our point across.

4th Grade, your assignment is to find an interesting poem or short story to present orally at the club meeting. Complete Expression Explosion & Discover 4-H Activity Pages for your folder.
Due _____

Rules:

1. Choose something to read that will last **1 minute**—a poem, short story or part of a book for your reading. Choose something interesting.
2. Practice reading aloud, using lots of expression, and speaking loud enough for the audience in the back of the room to hear you.
3. Stand up straight when you speak, don't lean against the wall and don't wiggle or rock back and forth. Be sure you can pronounce all the words.
4. Speakers advancing to the county will write their own speech for the county contest. *(Refer to the 5th grade rules for county contest.)*

TIPS for anyone making an oral presentation—a speech, a report, a reading, a part in a play or skit, etc.

- ☆ Ask your parent, older brother or sister, or friend to listen to your speech and **PRACTICE ... PRACTICE ...PRACTICE!!!**
- ☆ On the day of the contest, speak up and try to make **"eye contact"** with the audience. Your voice and your body language help you to communicate. Think about how you can use tone, speed, rhythm, pitch, stress, and volume to keep your audience interested.



4-H Public Speaking Contest (5th grade and up)

GOAL: To improve verbal communication skills by writing and giving a speech in 4-H.

1. **On what?** Topic is OPEN— to the discretion of the speaker. Topic ideas include 4-H, environment, patriotism, bullying, character, service, your hero, teamwork, current issue that affects you and your friends, or any other topic that you are interested in. You might consider relating your speech to one of the Six Pillars of Character (*Responsibility, Respect, Trustworthiness, Fairness, Caring and Citizenship*). **Senior High speakers must have a speech about 4-H.**

2. **How long?** 5th Grade Speeches should be 1-3 minutes at the local contest and about 2-5 minutes at the county. The 6th - 12th speeches should be 2-7 minutes.



3. **Organize** your thoughts and make notes to help you communicate better with your audience. If necessary use 3x5 note cards - BUT don't plan to read every word.

4. More ideas at robertson.tennessee.edu.

5. *Senior High only: Competition includes prepared speech and extemporaneous speech (given a topic on the spot - 1 minute to prepare, 2 minutes to speak)*

6. **Be sure you have:**

- ☆ **an introduction (to get everyone's attention & give the main idea).**
- ☆ **your information well-organized in the body of the speech. Make three to five points about the topic that should include reasons why they are important.**
- ☆ **a closing to end the speech, remind the audience of your main points and share your feelings about the topic.**

4-H Poster Art - Two Options

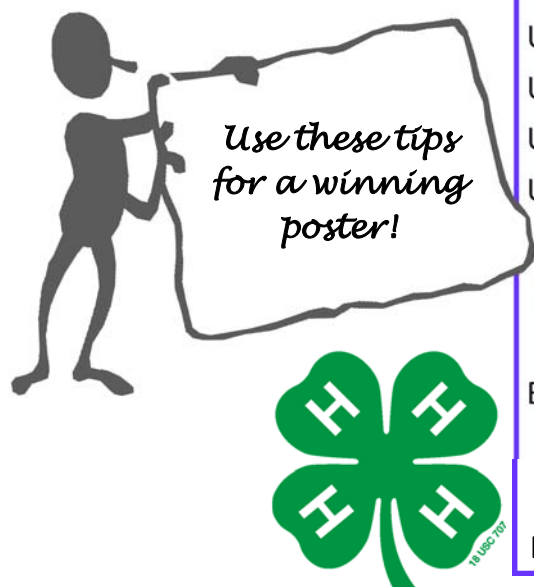
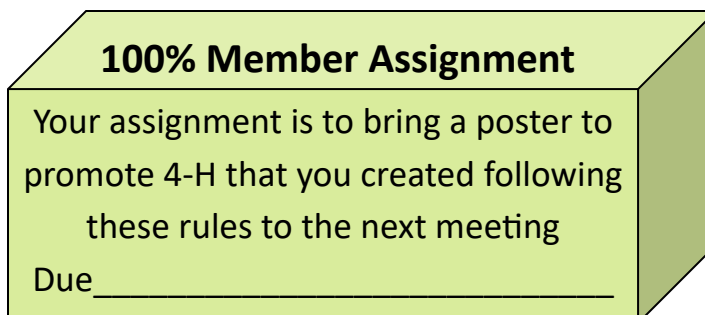
GOAL: To learn the importance of communicating visually.

Rules

1. Only one 4-H'er may work on a poster.
One entry per member.
2. **Regular Poster** must be 14x22 inches.
Digital Poster and Regular Poster must be horizontal/landscaped.
3. Your poster must say something about

4-H - it should have a short, catchy title or theme and artwork to illustrate your idea and include at least one 4-H clover. Look for clover patterns in this handbook or on the internet. The stem must be turned to the right.

4. Put your name, class, school and grade ON THE BACK OF THE POSTER.
Name your digital file with your name, club, and school, *i.e.* JDoe_Smith_CHES



BE NEAT! Keep regular poster for the county fair.

Use color.

Use simple words and messages.

Use a 4-H clover on your poster—*stem turns to the right*

Use lightly penciled guidelines for letters (top and bottom.)

Make your lettering easy to read with the smallest letters at least one inch tall.

Be creative - try to come up with an idea that no one else has used. Check out the rules/scorecard at

Do Not Use...

- well-known cartoon figures
- anything that sticks out 1/8" or more
- loose glitter
- any letters or artwork on top of official clover
- small pictures that are hard to see
- crowded lettering and artwork
- letter printed vertically
- mixed up colors for letters in the same word

Share Your 4-H Project - Demonstration (4th and 5th)

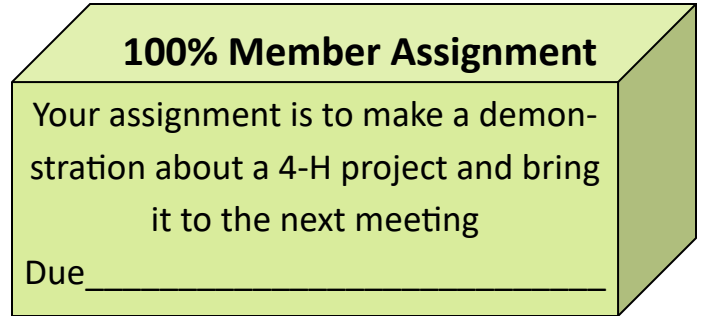


GOAL: To practice combining verbal & visual skills to communicate a message.

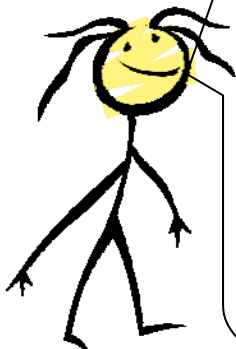
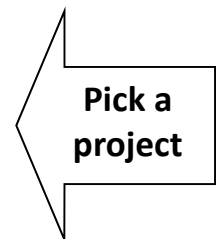
Give a demonstration teaching one simple project idea.

What is a demonstration? A demonstration is a talk that shows, one step at a time, how to do something while telling how to do it. Is it like a speech? Giving a demonstration is easier than giving a speech, because you can use visuals (posters, models, etc) while you are talking.

Here are a few rules:

- Demonstrations must relate to a 4-H topic (project) listed above.
- Time Limit—1-2 minutes at Club Level and 2-5 minutes at County Level
- No live animals!
- Must be an individual demonstration—**no teams**.
- Local club awards include participation, 1st, 2nd and 3rd place in each project represented in the contest.
- 4th & 5th Grade demonstration participants are eligible for the County Project Fair and a chance to go to the Sub-Regional Contest.

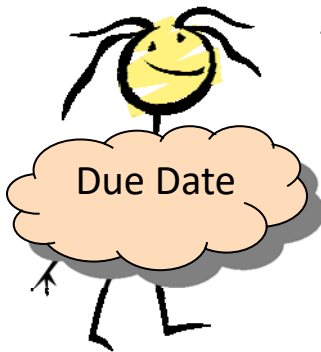
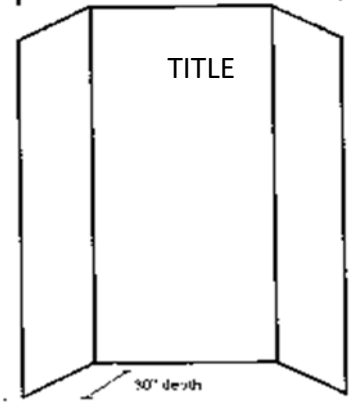
Share Your Project with a Table-Top Exhibit (6th-12th grade)

GOAL: To practice combining verbal & visual skills to communicate a message.

Use the table-top exhibit to share one idea or concept you have learned in your 4-H project.

Rules:

- Required for middle school and optional for senior high. Senior high All Stars may also exhibit at State 4-H Round-Up.



- Exhibits must be displayable on a 3'x3' table top. The area from the table top to the floor may also be utilized.
- Exhibits should be "free standing." A tri-fold (science-type board) works well. You should not use the scientific method terminology for this exhibit.
- Give a brief oral explanation of your exhibit.
- Use color, bold lettering, and keep it simple. Construction paper works well as a background to items placed on the

board. Don't forget to include props on the table itself when needed to "get your message across."

- Bring your table-top to your club meeting or the County Project Fair to earn points for 100% member.

Report exhibits on the project profile page 305A. Examples include:

- Enter table-top exhibit in local, county and regional project fairs.
- Enter table-top exhibit in the county fair.
- Senior high All Stars can take an exhibit to Round-Up.
- Other exhibits could be...project photographs, newspaper articles, published recipes, animals, art and craft shows, fair entries, etc. that relate to your 4-H project.

It's Time to Share Your Project Folder

GOAL: To develop record keeping skills and communicate by writing project achievements.



- ❑ Locate your 4-H project folder including your activity page or project book—and follow page 7.
- ❑ Be sure you have completed the project plan.
- ❑ Do the activities by yourself, with a friend or a family member. Put your work in your folder.
- ❑ Write down anything you do that is related to your project on your Form 540.

- ❑ When you complete your project plan submit your project folder to your 4-H leader—due at the 4th meeting.

4-H Photo Search Contest

GOAL: To gain skills in communicating visual messages through photography.

RULES:

- ☆ Submit 1 to 4 photos **that you took** and include a caption (title) for your entry.
- ☆ Mount each photo separately on an 8½ x 11 piece of cardstock/poster board.
- ☆ Put your name, class, school, grade on the back.
- ☆ Digital photography is acceptable. Be sure you print your digital photo, trim and mount as with other photos.
- ☆ Entries will be judged on neatness, following the rules, quality of photo.
- ☆ Be creative. Check out the “subject”, the background and the lighting, for best results. **NO SELFIES.**
- ☆ Local 1st, 2nd and 3rd. County 1st, 2nd and 3rd.
- ☆ **6th Grade & Up: Do Not Mount photo, which can be no larger than 5x7.**
- ☆ The top ten middle and high school winners will be submitted for state competition along with the official photo entry form.

5th Meeting Assignment

Photography is optional. You may choose to bring a photo you took and enter in the local contest. You may also choose to make a dairy poster.

Make a Dairy Poster

- ☆ Make a poster about milk or dairy products, how it is used in the diet, why it is important, what it does for you, etc. Be original.
- ☆ Use the theme shown below. **No 4-H Clovers.** Be original.
- ☆ Bring to your last meeting. Winning posters will be in the county contest.
- ☆ Posters should be 14 x 22 inches, no copyrighted cartoon characters or 3-D.
- ☆ County winner receives a t-shirt. *Past State Prizes: \$550, \$300, \$200*
- ☆ **This year's theme is - The Art of Dairy**

4-H Baking Contest

GOALS: To demonstrate the ability to follow directions by reading a recipe, measuring correctly and baking bread.



Bring baked goods that you mixed up and baked yourself at home to your last 4-H club meeting.

Where do you begin?

- Ask your parent for permission to bake bread.
- Read the recipe carefully. Follow directions.
- Gather the ingredients and equipment needed.
- Wash your hands and work area. To kill germs, wash for 20 seconds.
- Be careful using the oven. Set the temperature before you start. Allow the oven to preheat before baking.
- Let your baked items cool completely, then seal in a plastic container or plastic bag to bring to the contest.
- Only submit the category for your grade. Entries of 3 must be the same recipe.



4th Grade: Cornbread—Bring 3, any shape—baked.

5th Grade: Sweet Flour Muffins (no cornmeal or yeast)

Bring three. Examples: blueberry, bran, chocolate, etc. It is better to bake your muffins without paper liners. Grease your muffin tins first and then pour your batter, filling the tins 2/3 full.

6th Grade: Cookies - bring 3.

7th Grade: Quick Loaf Bread -
bring 1/2 loaf, unsliced

8th Grade: Cupcake Wars - bring 3

Sr. High: Yeast Bread - any shape

Three Levels of Recognition in Tennessee 4-H

First Level—Honor Club

It all begins with Honor Club—you don't "win" but are recognized for your participation in 4-H—project work, leadership and service. Report 200 points on the application. Where do you get points for the Honor Club application?

Count everything you have done since the 4th grade, 4-H project related, plus leadership and citizenship activities. Application on the web.

Annual County Awards Program

Each year Robertson County has an awards banquet in the fall to recognize participation for the previous year. Sixth grade and up 100% members will be invited, plus all county winners, regional and state participants are included. Volunteers and sponsors are also recognized. In addition, any Honor Club members who have completed their application in the previous year, will be invited to come to participate in the 4-H Honor Club installation ceremony.

4-H Shooting Sports groups are organized in Robertson County. Hunter safety education is required for shotgun and encouraged for all teams. State competitions will be scheduled. Trap and skeet shooting practices are scheduled throughout the year. Let us know of your interest. Certified volunteer leaders provided training and leadership for



the shotgun, BB Gun and archery teams. **Don't forget Target SMART Camp!**

Judging Team Events and Activities

What's a judging team? Three or four 4-H members come together to make a team. Members might be ranking animals or products as to quality, identifying items, and making decisions as individuals. The scores of each member are then compiled together as a team score.

Coaches will provide training and practice sessions to help you learn about the contest and how you will judge in the event. Grade requirements vary from contest to contest.

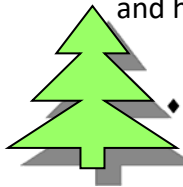
Sign Up at the Extension Office if Interested

- ◆ **Judging Animals: Livestock, Dairy, Poultry, and Horse** are the options. Members are asked to place animals 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th.



- ◆ **Wildlife judging:** Members will learn the food, cover, shelter, and other needs of different kinds of wildlife.

- ◆ **Land Judging:** Members will determine soil class, water holding capacity, slope, crop yields, and home site suitability.



- ◆ **Forestry:** Everything you need to know about trees begins here - join Mr. Timmy in building a Robertson County 4-H Forestry Judging Team.



- ◆ **Consumer Decision Making Judging:** Everyone is a shopper and this event works well with every 4-H project. Study materials are available online on the county website. This judging team has competitions for both junior high and senior high. The contest will be in September.

- ◆ **FCS Skillathon**—identify items from sewing/clothing, interior design and foods/cooking.

- ◆ **Outdoor Cookery:** Grilling is a popular way to prepare meat and poultry. Learn how to compete by learning best grilling techniques. Local contest at the County Fair.

- ◆ **Meats:** Where does a rib eye steak come from? Learn to identify wholesale and retail cuts of beef, pork and lamb, and also the best cooking methods for each cut.



- ◆ **Dairy Products:** 4-H members in the 7th-12th grade are eligible. Evaluate milk, cheese, ice cream and distinguish real from artificial dairy products.

Target SMART


4-H Target SMART Camp is a program of [Tennessee 4-H Shooting Sports](#). It is for youth who are enrolled in grades 5-12. Located at the W.P. Ridley 4-H Center in Columbia, Tennessee, campers learn appropriate skills to succeed in a variety of shooting sports such as archery, rifle, shotgun use, muzzle loading, and outdoor skills. Programs emphasize safety, correct form, and responsible use of firearms.




Adventure Camp Crossville

Join other Middle Tennessee 4-H'ers at Camp York in Crossville for Junior High Adventure Camp. Sixth-eighth graders can start the summer with an adventure! All camp grades are based on 1-1-20.

Middle and West Tennessee 6th—9th graders may choose to attend an outdoor and wildlife adventure camp in West Tennessee. This camp is geared to 4-H'ers who enjoy nature and want to experience the outdoors. The camp dates are June 1-4, 2021 (tentatively).

Junior 4-H Summer Camp

Junior Camp is for 4th-6th grade 4-H members and is held at Camp Ridley in **Columbia, TN., May 31-June 4, 2021.**

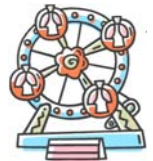



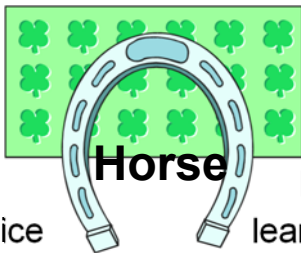
