I have been a member of Smith Co. FCE since 2005 after having received an invitation to a meeting from a friend. I had just retired from my career as an R.N. and moved back to Carthage, TN to care for my elderly father and a disabled brother that I knew would need care after my father passed.

It was a great opportunity to become acquainted with others in the community and make new friends as well as learn new skills. Janie Pedigo was a great extension agent and before long I was elected president of my local club. I remember she said to me one day, "You are an encourager". This led to other leadership responsibilities and after a

few years I served as president of the Smith County Council. About the same time I was asked to serve on the Public Health Council for Middle Tennessee and after 6 years was asked to become the President of the Board of Directors. This kept my interest in the health care industry alive while being able to be an advocate for public health services.

The opportunity for volunteer work was exploding. My friend who played accordion talked me into learning to play and when I protested that just because I played piano didn't mean I knew anything about accordions she exclaimed, "Just take it home & try it. You'll figure it out." It took about two weeks and then it clicked so I then became a volunteer accordion player. At this time I have four music ministries a month that I do with my local pastor: Senior Citizens, Smith Co. Pavilion, Smith Co. Health Care and the Alzheimer's Center. I also do fund raisers at Thanksgiving and at Christmas.

I have also served as pianist for several different churches and have played for a southern gospel quartet. In 2018 I was asked to run for Smith County Commissioner and was successful in my bid. About a year ago my friend Wanda Briddelle called me up out of the blue and asked me if I would consider running for VP for Programs for Central Region. I was honored that she would think of me for this important job. I hope that during my time in this position I have once again been an "encourager".
